Geography (B.Sc.), Canada, 01. Sep. 2018 – 24. Apr. 2019, Acadia University

I am a third-year geography student and I went to Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia, eastern Canada, to study there for an academic year.

The first couple of weeks were all about getting introduced to the university, your department and all the other new students on campus. A welcoming week for international students started a couple of days ahead of the welcoming week, which was prepared for all "freshmen". The Wong International Center organized a shopping trip for new international students, as well as several trips around the Annapolis Valley. Unfortunately, I could not participate in the international students welcoming week, but that did not affect me in any way. The staff on campus would make sure everybody would know about important events.

What I experienced during the freshmen week at Acadia was definitely different to what I experienced during my first few weeks in Freiburg. It was all about hyping up the university spirit and getting involved. Each residence prepared for a big final competition, which included games and little shows.

Acadia does not offer geography as a major, but I was planning on taking elective courses anyway. Most of my classes took place at the science department. The professors were all very nice and would help me wherever you would need their help. I had not set up my final schedule by the time I arrived in Canada, but I was well advised by my department about courses that I could potentially take.

I had decided to live on campus, in residence. On the one hand, because it was the easiest way of finding a place to stay, on the other hand because I had talked to previous exchange students and they had all recommended it. I am currently staying in a single room in the quiet section in "Cutten". I am happy with my room so far. It is small, but offers everything you need. The best thing about it is, that you are super close to everything. If you stay in residence the meal plan is mandatory. I had the 7-day unlimited dining plan. The food is good for a meal hall and offers a lot of different meals. It is kind of like a buffet and you can go there as often as you would like to. Never than less, the food is differed from what I was used to eat back home in Germany and I would have sometimes liked to eat something else, like "real" bread instead of

toast or a bagel. The good thing is that meal hall saves you a lot of time every day, since you do not have to go grocery shopping, cook or even do the dishes. Also, meal hall is the place where you meet friends every day. Never than less, I do definitely miss some good German food! After going to meal hall for a full semester, I started to appreciate what I was used to eat back home a lot more.

Acadia offers a medical and dental insurance, but I decided to opt out. The insurance I had was called "Care Concept USA" by HansaMerkur.

Since I was going to stay in Canada for a whole academic year, I had to apply for a study permit. Once you get the permit you will be given an eTA as well. You do not need to apply/pay for the eTA separately.



The use is free for all students and going to the gym and the pool became part of my weekly routine. On the weekends I liked to go see the Acadia ice hockey or basketball team play.

The first term at Acadia went by really fast and I enjoyed my time abroad a lot.

Wolfville is small, but offers many little nice spots to discover. I think, how great a




