The arrival in the US was very well organized. So we started off in Portland where all the exchange students from Baden Württemberg flew in and gathered to start our 'ExplOregon' week we signed up before we left. We spent the week in Oregon with different activities which all have been organized for us. After the week we have been dropped off at our final destination cities to start our semester(s) abroad.

The first week in Corvallis started on Wednesday with several orientation and information sessions on campus. We got provided with brochures and maps and a personalized schedule for the welcome week to keep track of the countless events we had to or could participate in. The university organized five days of program for all new students including introduction speeches of professors, campus tours, free food, introductions of each department, trips to shops to get furniture, interactive quizzes, presentation of helpful facilities on campus and where to find them and introduction to sport clubs and facilities. Not all of the information we got these days were new to us as some has been covered at the preparation seminars before. Also some of the tours and introductions had some facts double covered, which is why we did not take part in all of the events they offered.

Some formalities especially course selection took a while to figure out how to properly do them. We started back home in Germany already to select our classes, what made the whole process a little easier. The fact that we are able to drop and add classes within the first official week gave us time to work over our schedules after we actually experienced it. The process is not quite easy and it takes a while to understand it, but once I spent a little time with it I could figure it out and set my schedule right.

As I am not living on campus I had to spent the first two weeks searching for a place to stay. It is definitely time intensive and quite stressful sometimes because you have to click through a lot of room advertisements and text a lot of people to actually arrange interviews. While I was doing this Corvallis had the great opportunity to stay at the International House for as long as I wanted to. Also it was a great way to meet more internationals as you don't really meet them on campus or during classes. I would definitely recommend to search for off campus living after your arrival if someone is staying for more than one term. It might be a little uncomfortable and overwhelming first because you have to deal with all the new surroundings and people in the first weeks but there are definitely plenty of options to find something.

My highlight in the first weeks was the official welcoming of all new students for Fall term 2019. We gathered inside the basketball/volleyball coliseum where several deans of the different departments held some speeches and welcomed us students at OSU. After this we walked into the Reser stadium (American Football) while all fraternity and sorority members of Corvallis were gathering outside, leading us the way and cheering at us.

In the stadium itself the marching band introduced us to the common songs and chants they would play at the sports games and events. To top that off all new students of 'OSU class 2019' gathered on the football field to form the letters "O-S-U" to take a picture. It was the most memorable day for me because I felt like I am part of something really big and everyone was so welcoming and happy that we are here.

Compared to Germany the campus is definitely different. The whole city is built around the campus. It's a huge area and it takes a few months to figure out where all the buildings are you need to go to. But walking around with google maps open is definitely a common and necessary thing to do. Also walking around in Beaver gear is more than welcome and common among the students.

Something you really have to adapted to as an European coming into the US is the nightlife culture. Remembering to not drink in public or even carrying around open containers of alcohol is challenging in the beginning. Also the closing hour of most bars are 2am, during the week sometimes even 12am.

Another difference is the study system they have here. Throughout the whole term you have to do homework, online or in-class quizzes, weekly assignments and group projects in a bigger extend then back home. Some classes can demand quite a lot but it is manageable if you keep up with the class content and don't leave everything until the last hours before the due date. As a European I would compare it to a school-type of classes rather than a university.

On a usual day here I start with classes in the morning. Usually I have 2-3 classes a day, depends on how u managed your schedule. I would be done by 3 or 4pm (includes breaks of approximately an hour in between classes) and would head to the Recreation center (gym) for a workout. After that I would either get myself some lunch/dinner on campus or go home and cook something, get some homework done and catch up with friends after to go out to the bars or just hang out at someone's place.

Regarding my schedule for the first two terms, it differs from my schedule in Freiburg insofar, that a class you are enrolled in usually takes place two or even three times a week. So in the first place it looks like 12 credits are an easy schedule with four three-credit or even three four-credit classes a week. But the classes are spread over the week, which means you have less classes then in Germany. However, you spend more time in class. Also the majority of classes take attendance really serious, especially the physical activity classes and the ones where there are not many people in one class. But the course scheduler gives you a good opportunity to schedule your classes like you want them to be, for example Fridays off are always appreciated

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


